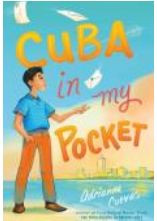


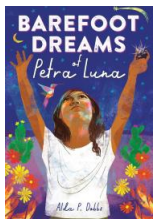
T Ang - *Soldier Dog* by Sam Angus

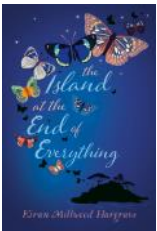
T Cue - *Cuba in My Pocket* by Adrianna Cuevas

In 1961 Cuba, with the threat of military service for children looming, twelve-year-old Cumba's parents send him to Miami, where he lives with a new family and misses his homeland.



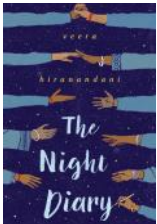
T Dob - *Barefoot Dreams of Petra Luna* by Alda P. Dobbs

T Jac - *Midnight Without a Moon* by Linda Williams Jackson

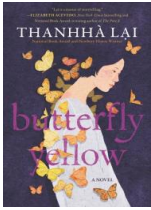

by Cynthia Kadohata

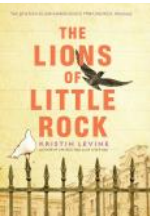

by Walter Dean Myers

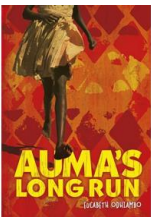

by Jennifer A. Nielsen

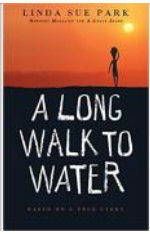

by Eucabeth Odhiambo

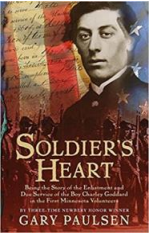

by Gary Paulsen

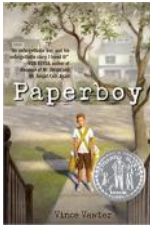
Eager to enlist, fifteen-year-old Charley has a change of heart after experiencing both the physical horrors and mental anguish of Civil War combat.

by Vince Vawter

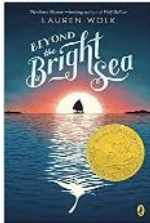
When an eleven-year-old boy takes over a friend's newspaper route in Memphis in July, 1959, his debilitating stutter makes for a memorable month.
